

Critically Endangered Species Consultation Context document

Background

The protection of biodiversity is a central principle of organic food production. The Soil Association has higher standards in areas where we know organic licensees can go further than required by legislation.

We recognise that sustainable wild harvesting can have a positive impact, helping protect biodiversity by supporting rural livelihoods and incentivising conservation. Conversely, if not sourced with care, trade in wild harvested species can lead to negative impacts, such as endangering vulnerable species or habitats.

We would like to strengthen our assurance that critically endangered species are safeguarded by aligning the requirements of our food and drink standards with our farming standards.

The aim of this consultation is to provide stakeholders with an opportunity to comment and input into this proposal.
